A Note from the Pastor

The bow tie's origin can be traced to a specific military unit, the Croats, who fought in the Thirty Years War of the 1600s. The Croats' battle dress, which included fur hats, long red or black cloaks, and scarves tied at the neck, was not just a fashion statement. These scarves, with their dual function of keeping shirts closed and contributing to hygiene, were more than just practical. As Croatian

folklore suggests, they were symbolic, protecting the neck during battle, or perhaps sentimental. Women would tie scarves around the necks of their loved ones as they left for war, a token of love and fidelity. Whatever their purpose, these scarves left a lasting impression.

Following the soldiers' service in France under the Royal Cravates regiment, the French took the accessory into high society, appropriately called la cravate. Some argue that the cravat led to the necktie and then the bow tie. Others say it was the opposite—the Croat fashion was first tied into a bow and later lengthened into the necktie. Either way, Croatians are intensely proud of their association with the cravat, and in 2008, the Croatian parliament declared October 18 as the annual Cravat Day.

But it wasn't until the 1800s that the bow tie as we know it today became popular. In 1886, Pierre Lorillard IV broke the mold when he wore a black tie to an event at his family's estate in Tuxedo Park, NY. Until then, the day's fashion dictated that men wear white ties and tails to formal gatherings. Bow ties soon became the "it" accessory, and by the time the 20s roared into history, they served as a signature piece for people of all persuasions - from Winston Churchill and Charlie Chaplain to Marlene Dietrich and Frank Sinatra. (*History was taken from R. Hanauer's website - bowties.com*)

My personal history with bow ties isn't centuries old. I began wearing them as a seminarian in the late 1990s and have never turned back! Wearing bow ties is not for everyone. But, the practice has become a part of who I am. I almost lean into it as a badge of honor. As we prepared to move to Greenwood, Jennifer stayed in Georgia to direct the packers and loaders. She found a stash of regular neckties I had been holding onto for decades...just in case. She knows that wearing bow ties is so much a part of who I am that she gave the kneck ties away to one of the movers! I am now "all in" wearing bow ties.

Colossians 3: 12-15 says, "As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful." Our life in Christ should be no different. People should run across us and know immediately whose we are - not only a child of God, but also a Christ-follower. They should clearly see how we proudly confess our love for God and our neighbor with our lips and actions. How will you 'clothe yourself' this month to proudly signify that you follow Christ above all else?



It is also advisable to notify the Stewardship Committee of any suggested revisions so the committee can follow up with committees on suggested revisions. The Stewardship Committee will review the final draft of the proposed Ministry Plan the first of October before it is presented to the Diaconate for approval.

The final version of the 2025 Ministry Plan will be presented to the congregation for a vote at the Annual Meeting on November 17.
