A Note from the Pastor

Living in Greenwood has offered me a reset of emotions in many ways. I had not realized the stress, frustration, and anger I was carrying from my commute to and from work while serving in Atlanta. I must confess I spent too much time talking to and yelling frustratedly at drivers who surrounded me on the I-75 corridor. With a bit of separation from the experience, I realized that carrying all that anger and frustration around shaped me, and not in a positive way. I gained some clarity after reading an article by Mark Tidsworth a few weeks ago. It helped me realize how these feelings of anger were shaping me.

In a portion of his article, he writes, "With this in mind, we are willing to spill some ink over one issue in churches which is directly hurting the mission... anger. No, not Holy Spirit-inspired anger. Not the anger rising when we witness or experience injustice, giving us the energy to get up and help set this world right. No, not the helpful kind of anger that reacts to the powerful oppressing the powerless. No, the anger described here is far more insidious, disguised as righteous indignation. This is self-serving indignation. So, what's a church to do when it sees itself in this mirror? What if even a small portion of your church's people are stuck in their anger?"

Tidsworth's article has me wondering: Am I an angry pastoral leader? Are we angry as a church? Do the decisions we make arise only from our frustrations and anger? If so, Tidsworth asks, "...what's a church to do when it sees itself in this mirror? What if even a small portion of your church's people are stuck in their anger?" He offers a few ways to navigate our rising anger that are worth considering.

We must recognize anger as a distress signal. Anger is usually a reaction to a deeper wound. We'd be smart to ask ourselves what is below the surface of our own anger that is distressing us in ways that fuel our anger.

We must raise awareness with accurate information about our cultural context. We always find a way to explain our experience. But we must be honest and not invent false explanations for what is driving our distress. These false assumptions can often lead to angry responses.

We must consider movement-oriented options that offer positive solutions to the **issues**. When we begin to accept the truth that we are journeying towards health, we can take positive steps, even in the midst of frustration and chaos.

We must return to our first love: the gospel's good news. Tidsworth says, "God so loves this world that God goes to extreme lengths to demonstrate that love in hopes that many will receive and embrace the beautiful Way of Jesus. The gospel is life-giving and life-altering. Focusing on ourselves, indulging the false narrative that we deserve cultural privilege, leads to a slow, depressing spiritual death." He is right on here.

Finally, we must shift from member to disciple identity. Membership identity in our culture has very little to do with the gospel of Jesus Christ. Jesus taught that laying down one's right to membership privileges is the way to life. When we forget ourselves, focus on God, and live into God's calling... that's when life grows really good.

So, what's got you frustrated and angry these days? Do you need to make some space and get back to Gospel-centeredness?

Missions in Music

During the month of September. John will be preaching about Missions - local, regional, and international. We will also be featuring special hymns and music that capture missions within music. The familiar song "Make Me a Servant" will be the Call to Worship each Sunday. A brand new hymn "We Serve the Prince of Peace" will be the Choral Response, with different verses each week. It incorporates a melody influenced by East Asian melodies. One upcoming anthem is "Send Us, Lord, To Every Nation" by Joseph M. Martin, that features a hymn-like tune and a wonderful trumpet descant. Another anthem, "Lord, Thy Church on Earth Is Seeking" by David Schwoebel, features a minor key melody that expands to include lush harmonies and suspensions. resolving in beautiful choral chords with expansive piano accompaniment. One particular verse reads:

In the streets of ev'ry city where the bruised and lonely dwell; We shall show the Savior's pity, We shall of His mercy tell.

On September 29, will be our **Music Emphasis Sunday** and highlight all of the FBC ensembles and choirs. The children and youth with sing, handbells will play, Chancel Choir and Sounds of Grace will sing, and Will Cleveland will play. Young-Beaudrot Scholar and Lander student Noah Skinner will offer percussion during an anthem titled "Sing a Festive Song!", incorporating Latin instruments and rhythms, written by our former music director and wonderful friend Larry Schultz.

August Diaconate Update

The August Diaconate meeting was held on August 18 at 6:00 pm. In addition to receiving reports from the staff, the Diaconate approved the following:

- Recommendation from the Personnel Committee concerning changes to Section 304: Health Insurance of the FBC Personnel Manual. The recommendation was to pay 100% of the cost of health insurance for employees and half the cost of insurance for families.
- Recommendation from the Property Committee for a Foundation Request to purchase three additional Philips Heartstart Onsite Defibrillator Units. One of the units will have pads for children and will be kept in the children's area.

The Diaconate also received a report on the Draft 2025 Ministry Plan before being presented to the congregation on Sunday, August 25.
